4 EXPRESSIONS TO AVOID SAYING ONCE YOU LEAVE THE FIELD

The car ride home after a game or practice can be a magnet for emotionally charged comments that could later lead to regret.

After a disappointing loss or performance, silence is a valid option if you aren't sure what your child wants to hear.

Here are four things you should avoid with your child after a hard loss:



- "If only you hadn't ..." Remember to give kids some credit. They know their performance wasn't great and probably feel bad about it. Reliving it could just make things worse.
- 2 "We worked on this." Let the coaches coach, and instead focus on giving your child the support he or she needs instead of discussing missed opportunities on the field.
- Why didn't the coach put you in?"

 Avoid asking why your child's playing time dwindled or why they lost a starting spot. It will only demoralize and discourage— and maybe even plant ideas that weren't there to begin with.
- 4 "I've seen you play harder than that."
 Effort and performance are unrelated, especially at younger levels. Avoid making kids feel like they have to please you while out on the field.
